The sorry history is that from 2008 to 2020 the average refinery efficiency fell by some 60%, implying a loss of daily capacity of 700,000 barrels. If Pemex could restore the capacity of 2008, four times the capacity would have been gained that from the prospective buyout of Shell's controlling interst in the Deer Park Refinery.
